## Sea Change: Atlantic Canada's New Demographic and Economic Landscape

Atlantic Canada is undergoing a dramatic transformation. This is particularly the case in the Maritimes. For as long as anyone can remember, the Maritimes' main challenge was to create jobs for its reserve army of workers. Today, it is facing the opposite challenge. Long a laggard, the Maritimes provinces are now the country's population and economic growth leader. Newfoundland and Labrador, for its part, faces a different reality, but there too, change is afoot.

This presentation will review the paradigmatic change Atlantic Canada is experiencing and discuss what the future holds in store. As is the case for all profound economic and social shifts, this sea change comes with major challenges. One of them, the housing crisis, is particularly daunting. The presentation will examine this challenge in greater detail and discuss potential solutions.



**Richard Saillant** is a Moncton-based economist, public policy consultant and resident scholar at the Donald J. Savoie Institute. He has spent two decades in government and academic circles, including in positions such as Vice President at l'Université de Moncton and Director General at Industry Canada. Richard is the author of four books, including *A Tale of Two Countries: How the Great Demographic Imbalance is Pulling Canada Apart.*

## Session 3

## Bridging the Gaps, Nova Scotia's Study and Stay™ Programs Championing International Student Supports in Nova Scotia in a Rapidly Changing Global Environment

This session provides an overview, results, and findings from the award-winning Study and Stay<sup>™</sup> - Nova Scotia program. Over the past six years, the Study and Stay<sup>™</sup> - Nova Scotia program has provided support to more than 400 students representing more than 60 different nationalities. The program has successfully retained an average of 86% of the graduates in Nova Scotia one-year post-graduation. Program alumni have started their careers in meaningful jobs aligned with their study plans and are thriving as new Nova Scotians. This session offers a review of the tools and practices that have been employed successfully to support international students' transition into the workplace using a six-pillar approach.

During the implementation of this program, we experienced a global pandemic, and the world has changed inextricably in a plethora of ways, many of which we do not yet understand. This session will provide an overview of what students, alumni and employers are reporting has changed and as a result, how the supports they need have changed. This session will also provide an overview of the planned Study and Stay CONNECT program to be launched this year, the new methods and approaches that will be incorporated based on lessons learned from the past six years of the program, and how best to respond to new challenges in student-centred services and programs for diverse populations using an eight-pillar approach, in a rapidly changing, pandemic affected global environment.



**Shawna Garrett**, originally from the Maritimes, has held registrarial and enrolment services positions at Acadia University, NSCAD University, College of the North Atlantic – Qatar, and Mount Allison University. She has also worked as a superintendent, principal, and dean at international schools in Japan and China. Shawna holds degrees from the University of Prince Edward Island and Acadia University and is currently a Ph.D. Candidate in educational studies through Nova Scotia's inter-university doctoral program. Shawna has been the President and CEO of EduNova since September 2022. She was a member of EduNova's founding board back in 2004 and has volunteered in a variety of capacities with the organization since its inception.



## iHUB Panel

The iHUB, which began in 2021, was designed to support unfunded forms of WIL. Since 2021 the Atlantic Region has had over 78 projects, with 2,631 student experiences, and a distribution of over 2.6 million dollars into the regional economy.
